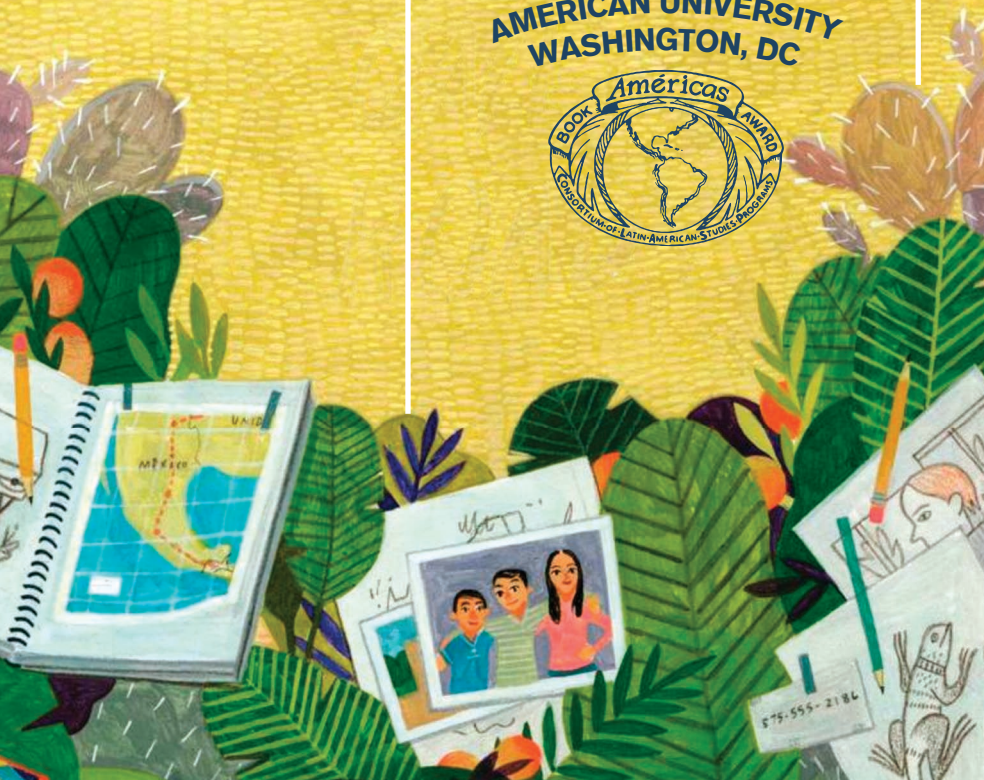

The Consortium of Latin American Studies Programs (CLASP) presents the 2017 Américas Award teacher workshop hosted by American University's International Training & Education Program. Speakers will include 2017 Américas Award winner author of *The Only Road*, Alexandra Diaz, as well as Reyna Grande, author of *The Distance Between Us*,



an honor book, and Nadia L. Hohn, author of *Malaika's Costume*, another honor book. These authors, along with Rebeca Gamez, curriculum specialist and Faye Colon from Teaching for Change, will engage participants with teaching strategies to accompany the books.

Participants will receive dinner, a book, and a certificate of completion with registration.
